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REDEEMING THE TIME

Because the Days Are Evil



Most of us are familiar with the idiom "Time and tide wait for no man". It describes the incessant passage of time, measured by the incremental ticking of the clock. Time is a precious commodity that we can neither store nor turn back once it is past. Each of us are allotted the same amount each day. A lot of efforts are being made by man to prolong life. Yet in reality, only God knows how long we would live, for the Bible tells us in Job 14:5 that

"A person's days are determined; you have decreed the number of his months and have set limits he cannot exceed." The question is: How should we live our lives or spend the time that God has given to us?

Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians in Chapter 5:16, exhorted them to "redeem the time because the days are evil" (King James Version). To redeem something means to buy it back or to regain possession of it.

In reality, we cannot buy back time! In fact, the Greek word translated as "time" here is actually "Kairos", which means opportunities rather than "Chronos" from which we get the word "chronology" or "time". In the New International Version translation, the same verse reads, "making the most of every opportunity". Every opportunity to do what? This is found in the preceding verse, "to live, not as unwise but wise".

An illustration may be helpful here. Suppose someone is in need of cash and decided to use something precious as collateral to borrow money in a pawn shop. It could be an heirloom or a wedding ring or some other object of worth. The exchange is meant to be temporary with every intention of redeeming the object at a later time by repaying the money with interest. In such a transaction, there's typically a window of opportunity for the redemption to take place. When that window closes, the opportunity is gone forever and the precious object may never be recovered, leading to a sense of great loss and regret! How many times have we told ourselves, "If only I could turn back time, I would..."?

In reality, we cannot buy back time! In fact, the Greek word translated as "time" here is actually "Kairos", which means opportunities rather than "Chronos" from which we get the word "chronology" or "time". In the New International Version translation, the same verse reads, "making the most of every opportunity". Every opportunity to do what? This is found in the preceding verse, "to live, not as unwise but wise". In other words, we are to seize every opportunity to live wisely, to do what is right by God and for the good of others. Redeeming the time is to live a life in a way that matters to God. By contrast, we are NOT to live foolishly or in a frivolous way by squandering our time and opportunities away, as many in the world do in the pursuit of selfish gains and pleasures.

Why is Paul's exhortation important or relevant? The same verse tells us it's because the days are evil. Paul was writing from a prison in Rome and nearing the end of his life. He had no idea when his life would come to an end and so he warned the Ephesian Christians to respond to every opportunity to do God's will before it's taken away forever.

As it was in Paul's days, these are evil days. Just last month, the world once again re-lived, through a series of documentaries on television, the dramatic events of September 11 that happened twenty years ago. That day was indelibly forged into everybody's minds when terrorists hijacked two planes and flew them into the twin towers of the World Trade Centre in New York City, decimating the buildings and killing thousands.

Cast your mind back to 1 January 2020. When you woke up that morning to the New Year, did you ever imagine that by March you would be in a complete lockdown in the face of a global pandemic which is still with us today? Some of us may know or have someone close who had suddenly lost their lives to the virus. We live in a fallen, sinful and broken world. Life is uncertain! None of us know how long we still have on this earth. As James puts it, "Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes." (James 4:14)

Jesus embraced the value of redeeming the time: "We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work" (John 9:4). Jesus was single-minded in carrying out the work of His Father. Kingdom work was never far from His mind. Now, this is not to say that there's no place for rest and recreation which can be beneficial and even essential. But too often, we allow ourselves to be distracted by a myriad of activities that are not conducive to personal spiritual formation or to the furtherance of God's Kingdom.

Seeing that we live in perilous times where the prevailing culture is to gravitate towards a life of ease and comfort and worldly ambition, let us challenge ourselves by asking "How are we prioritizing our time?" Are we wisely investing our time and energies in what would matter for eternity or are we drifting into complacency, content with laying up treasures here on earth? May God help us all to redeem our time because the days are evil!

H2O, alongside other LGs, was also part of the Talk2Us initiative. We supported a family from the Tamil congregation. We took part in grocery runs, reached out to connect with the family, and supported them where we could.

Rebecca: As a lukewarm backbencher and a serial ghost in church, and due to personal commitments, socializing with fellow brothers and sisters in church was never my key intention during my first 5 years at FBC. Then, I realized that growing up in a Buddhist family and working in a highly secular corporate culture have deprived me of opportunities to relate my faith and Christian experiences with others. There were only 3 persons in my social circle with whom I could do so openly.

H2O has been a good community where I can be at ease with sharing all the uncanny coincidences I have experienced, as well as the frustrations of

adulting and the burning questions I have about the Bible without prejudice and judgment. It is indeed satisfying and wholesome to be able to share with others about how God works mysteriously in my life through good times and tough times. Joining an LG has definitely affirmed my faith in Christ through fellowship and Bible study. Being part of an LG also satisfies my desire to share my testimony and encourage fellow brothers and sisters in their walk with God.


