## **Section A (Exegetical Questions)**

- 1. Explain what is the "mystery" which Paul is referring to in this passage? Why is it a mystery? How is our concept of a mystery different from its concept in Ancient Greece? Why was Paul willing to suffer for this mystery
- 2. What is the ultimate purpose of gospel and how is it related to Ephesians 1:9-10. How does this affect us personally?
- 3. Why does Paul refer himself as a prisoner of Christ rather than Rome? How does this perspective impact him in the course of his personal suffering? What can we learn of this in our personal lives

### **Reflection Questions**

- 4. How do you handle apparently senseless suffering in your life? What helps you and what is not helpful. Are any sufferings in your life actually senseless? Are there ways in which we can support each other during these difficult times?
- 5. If God achieves his purposes by using pain to test and strengthen us then why should we not pray for more trials?
- 6. What if you are feeling bitter at the suffering because God had allowed this to come upon you , why do you think you are feeling like this? What does this reveal about where your ultimate treasure lies?

#### **Section C**

#### **Case history**
