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UNLEASHING THE GOSPEL









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In many cultures, a father's role in parenting is often considered to be of secondary importance. Men are typically encouraged to embrace their roles as breadwinners, and this often results in the responsibility of raising children being left in full to mothers. Consequently, while everyone has a biological father, not everyone grows up experiencing a father figure in their life. Pope John XXIII once remarked, "It is easier for a father to have children than for children to have a real father."

There are many types of fathers out there- some present, some absent. But we know that those who step

into their God-ordained role to be faithful to their families and live uprightly will create a home that is a blessing to their children. Proverbs 20:7 says, "The righteous who walks in his integrity-blessed are his children after him!"

Believers and non-believers alike, fathers play a distinct role in modelling God's love through the way they show up for and engage their families. Some delight in playing with their children at the park. Some go out of their way to bring home family-favourite snacks. Some enjoy travelling with their families. Some fill the house with laughter and their

"dad jokes". Some love to tuck their children in at night and read them a bedtime story after a long day. Some work overtime and give their all to provide for the family. All these examples, and so much more, display a father's love.

Well then, what is it about Christian fatherhood that is different?

As Christian parents, we want the gospel of God's grace to shape our values, our ways of operating, and our identities. And it is God who has directed fathers to lead their families in His ways. In Genesis 18:19a, God said about Abraham: "For I have chosen him, so that he will direct his children and his household after him to keep the way of the Lord by doing what is right and just..."

Indeed, the most powerful influence a father can have on his children is having a heart that is deeply rooted in the truth of God's Word. This is developed through the purposeful determination to spend time reading the Word and praying, not just on his own but also together with the family. The evidence of a father's personal relationship with Jesus will show in his life- especially in his willingness to trust God in all things, even in adversity.

My (Rachel) dad used to call the family together for devotions. We would read a passage together and everyone had to pick a verse or two to share. I didn't particularly enjoy being prodded on during devotions because I had to be vulnerable in front of my parents, but it is an initiative that I have grown to appreciate. Quite often, my dad would also share with us the challenges we were facing as a family. We would then be given the opportunity to pray about it and pray for my parents too. I realized early on that it wasn't something "normal" parents did. Not many fathers or parents share openly and honestly with their children. But involving me and my brothers so closely in their journey with God is one of the best decisions my parents made. As a child, I always saw where God was leading my dad and, consequently, where my dad was leading us as a family. That helped build my faith.

It is as important for a father to lead his family in God's ways as it is for him to live by example. This takes a good measure of honesty and humility, which can be shown in one's willingness to acknowledge when they have erred. Fathers are reminded in Colossians 3:21 and Ephesians 6:4 not to provoke their children, but to "bring them up in the instruction

and discipline of the Lord." When a father is willing to admit dependence on God and seek forgiveness, he sets a powerful example for his children. After all, how can children learn about forgiveness if there is little forgiveness in the family?

Children who see their parents forgiving one another will do likewise. Equally powerful is parents seeking forgiveness from their children. The willingness to say "I am sorry" builds bridges, restores relationships, and allows parents to set a godly example. Ultimately, it reflects a willingness to take a step back and go back to God. Naturally, some wounds take longer to heal, but the rewards that come with loving our children in a way that honours God will make the long journey worth our while.

My (Rachel) dad is a man of few words. If there was any way for me to count, I wouldn't be surprised to find that he has said more to God in prayer than he has to me, my brothers, and my mom combined! And though his words were few, he did not stinge on apologies. I can recall the times when he's said sorry to my mom and us, either directly or through his prayer during family devotions. I know it was the work of the Holy Spirit through years of sanctification, as it is for all of us. But when a father is willing to take a step back and bring himself before God's throne of grace, God's love and renewal will wash over his family. I must say, a sincere apology goes a long way, especially when it comes from a parent! Sure, they/ we will make the same mistakes again, but I have learned from my relationship with my parents that humility is an evidence of love, and it builds precious, lasting bridges. God honours every father who trusts His wisdom in leading the family God has given him.

Billy Graham once said, "A good father is one of the most unsung, unpraised, unnoticed, and yet one of the most valuable assets in our society." Fatherhood is a wonderful privilege and a huge responsibility that comes with a lot of unknowns. But what is certain is God will provide the grace, the love, and the wisdom to the father who lives by faith in His Son. To him, God will say "well done."



Tell us about KARIS.

KARIS is a community comprising of seniors who are brothers and sisters in Christ. We are all part of God's great family.

Our mission is to provide spiritual and social support to seniors within and outside our congregation. The KARIS ministry's goal is to provide continuous support to our seniors in their commitment to seek a closer relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ. As an outreach to seekers, we help seniors seek spiritual growth in community. Many KARIS members have been encouraged to join FBC's Alpha, Beta, and Gamma programs because ultimately, the purpose of this ministry is to love, obey, and proclaim Christ Jesus.

Share with us what "KARIS" means.

The word KARIS is significant to us. Karis is of Greek origin, meaning "grace". In biblical terms, it is "the love and mercy given to us by God because God desires us to have it, not necessarily because of anything we have done to earn it". It is an attribute of God that is most manifest in the salvation of sinners.

KARIS is also an acronym that stands for:

- **K** Show **Kindness** and concern for one another (caring).
- A Available for each other.
- R Reach out to family, friends, and neighbours.
- I Be Instructed in His word.
- S Be available to Serve.

What do KARIS members do when you meet?

Our fellowship meets every Wednesday. Together, we pray, worship, study, learn, consume good food, and enjoy each other's company. During the pre-pandemic time, we organized day trips each year to different places of interest, as well as overnight retreats to different holiday resorts. And besides our regular weekly programs of worship, prayer meeting, and devotion by invited speakers, we also had activities such as guitar lessons, Sudoku sessions, board games, and line dancing.

How has KARIS adapted to the new normal?

In the past year, although we could not meet physically, we thank God that we were able to meet virtually through Zoom. We are grateful for the opportunity to meet and make new friends in the breakout rooms. As we continued to meet weekly, we have become closer and more willing to share with one another.

To enable worship and fellowship to continue during the pandemic, our Committee set up our first Zoom meeting on 1 April 2020. The initial attendance was low because many members were unfamiliar with the Zoom App. However, with encouragement and coaching, more and more members began to log in as the months passed. As members became more familiar with using Zoom, they even started inviting their friends, and we have been delighted to see new faces. All glory to our Almighty God!







The KARIS ministry has since held a full Zoom worship program every Wednesday, from 10am to 12pm. The average weekly logged in devices is 48. We even held a Zoom Special for Christmas and Chinese New Year where we saw more than 60 devices logged in. This is equivalent to slightly more than 70 persons, since many of the devices are shared between spouses.

What is something KARIS is thankful for in the past year?

Praise the Lord that feedback has been very encouraging and positive. The format of our Zoom meetings is now more focused; the intercessory prayers and the breakout sessions are well-participated. Members have expressed that Zoom has fostered a closer bond among them compared to when they were meeting physically. They find that they are more open to share during the breakout room sessions, and enjoy time spent meaningfully and effectively in learning God's Word.

Under our current circumstances, meeting virtually is one of the most practical ways that seniors, some of whom are living on their own, can communicate and be in community with fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. It is also a blessing that many have volunteered in the areas of worship song leading, prayer, scripture reading, and sharing of testimonies.



Scripture has much to say about old age. Job 12:12 says, "Wisdom is with the aged, and understanding in length of days." And Proverbs 16:31 says, "Gray hair is a crown of glory; it is found on the path of righteousness."

Moving forward, we seek to reach out to more seniors to join us in this spiritual journey and spread the gospel. This year, despite the constraints, we have been able to recruit some talented members who are now helping in worship and corporate prayer. Also, due to the demand for online guitar lessons, we will be adding an extra beginner's class. There will also be a new beginner's group of Sudoku students. Getting old should not stop us from being active and living life to the fullest!
