James 5:1-6

"Come now, you rich, weep and howl for your miseries that are coming upon you! Your riches are corrupted, and your garments are moth-eaten. Your gold and silver are corroded, and their corrosion will be a witness against you and will eat your flesh like fire. You have heaped up treasure in the last days. Indeed the wages of the laborers who mowed your fields, which you kept back by fraud, cry out; and the cries of the reapers have reached the ears of the Lord of Sabaoth. You have lived on the earth in pleasure and luxury; you have fattened your hearts as in a day of slaughter. You have condemned, you have murdered the just; he does not resist you."

Case Study

Case 1 – Desensitization

Eng Hew Man grew up in a poor household. His family never made much money and they were heavily steeped in debt. Nevertheless, they had many good and genuine friends. With the little they had, Eng's family still shared what they had with those who were truly in need through the First Baptist Church's Manna Box.

When Eng became an adult, he felt the pressure of earning more and came across a job in sales. He was gifted in selling products to people and soon enough, he started to make a decent amount of money.

Unfortunately, in his greed, he started to approach his friends **only** to sell them his products. He would not attend to friends who needed help from him. He only responded to those who were interested to purchase what he was selling.

Additionally, he began to only spend time with richer colleagues, family, and friends. He would only visit those who had big houses and luxurious cars in expensive neighbourhoods like Mont Kiara and Damansara Heights.

Unlike his family, he became less generous with his wealth, and decided to not personally support any giving of aid to the poor to save more. He felt that the poor should work harder and help themselves out of poverty.
