Study 3 The Gospel and the Nature of Church Growth 1 Corinthians 3:1-17

1 Corinthians 3:1-8

"1 And I, brethren, could not speak to you as to spiritual people but as to carnal, as to babes in Christ. 2 I fed you with milk and not with solid food; for until now you were not able to receive it, and even now you are still not able; 3 for you are still carnal. For where there are envy, strife, and divisions among you, are you not carnal and behaving like mere men? 4 For when one says, "I am of Paul," and another, "I am of Apollos," are you not carnal?

5 Who then is Paul, and who is Apollos, but ministers through whom you believed, as the Lord gave to each one? 6 I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase. 7 So then neither he who plants is anything, nor he who waters, but God who gives the increase. 8 Now he who plants and he who waters are one, and each one will receive his own reward according to his own labor.

9 For we are God's fellow workers; you are God's field, you are God's building. 10 According to the grace of God which was given to me, as a wise master builder I have laid the foundation, and another builds on it. But let each one take heed how he builds on it. 11 For no other foundation can anyone lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ. 12 Now if anyone builds on this foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw, 13 each one's work will become clear; for the Day will declare it, because it will be revealed by fire; and the fire will test each one's work, of what sort it is. 14 If anyone's work which he has built on it endures, he will receive a reward. 15 If anyone's work is burned, he will suffer loss; but he himself will be saved, yet so as through fire.

Wrong focus in Church Growth - Focus on leaders (v. 5-22)

A. Leaders are servants with specific assignments

1 Corinthians 3:5

"5 Who then is Paul, and who is Apollos, but ministers through whom you believed, as the Lord gave to each one?"

Wrong focus in Church Growth - Building on the wrong foundation (v. 5-22)

A. Build only on Christ

1 Corinthians 3:9-11

"9 For we are God's fellow workers; you are God's field, you are God's building. 10 According to the grace of God which was given to me, as a wise master builder I have laid the foundation, and another builds on it. But let each one take heed how he builds on it. 11 For no other foundation can anyone lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ."

B. Build using imperishables - Only imperishables will survive impending judgment

1 Corinthians 3:12-15

"12 Now if anyone builds on this foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw, 13 each one's work will become clear; for the Day will declare it, because it will be revealed by fire; and the fire will test each one's work, of what sort it is. 14 If anyone's work which he has built on it endures, he will receive a reward. 15 If anyone's work is burned, he will suffer loss; but he himself will be saved, yet so as through fire."


Wrong focus in Church Growth - Misunderstanding the vision of the church (v. 5-22)

Case Study

Case 1 – Church Growth

Joseph King has been the elder of The Explosion Baptist Church for over 30 years. Under his guidance, the church has grown from 120 members to 5000 members.

The church began with a small weekly Bible study and prayer fellowship but the numbers did not grow in its first two decades. Seeing this stagnation, he decided to revamp the programmes of the church, saying that there is a need for revival.

He started new cell group meetings among different members and encouraged them to meet to have fellowship. During these cell group meetings, he encouraged everyone to worship together and to eat together for bonding with one another. However, he also decided to no longer have Bible study and prayer meetings as part of the church programme since they were not very

fruitful. Apparently, not many were interested in studying God's Word and he did not want to lose new members to boredom.

On Sundays, Joseph only chose sermon topics that would benefit the congregation, such as "How to Activate God's Blessings in Your Life", "Unlocking the Power of the Spirit in Your Relationships", "Faith to Heal - Only Believe!", etc. Previously, the sermons were based on chapters of the Bible but he thought it was not a good approach as his church members found it too dry.

Additionally, he made sure that the money collected every Sunday was spent renovating the church building to make it look as attractive as possible. He included new spotlights, integrated sound systems, and smoke generators with lasers to make the worship experience truly one of a kind.

When questioned about his decisions by his fellow elders, he said that he has been an elder for 30 years and has seen what is effective and what is not effective. He refuses to take advice from anyone who was not as experienced as him.

After all, now that the number of church members has grown to the 5000 mark under his leadership, he says that it is an achievement that very few church elders can ever make in their lifetime.
