Both Peter and John glorified God but John was not martyred. Couldn't we learn the same lessons without so much pain? In the last five months, there was much anguish, physically, emotionally, and spiritually, but there were also many mountaintop experiences that have enriched my personal relationship with God. I would like to share just two with you so you know what an amazing God we have.

Just a few days into my stay in Serdang Hospital, I was seized by panic attacks, which caused breathlessness, and in turn, sleeplessness. These attacks occurred each time I tried to lie down to get some sleep and it took time to get back to normal breathing. Fear was certainly present, but what was I fearful about? I know for certain where I am headed after death having known God for so long, I must admit the favorite pastime of the patients reporting who in which bed did not make it through the night, did not help.

I finally found relief when I recited and meditated on Psalm 23 the minute I laid my head down. I wasn't gasping for air anymore as long as Psalm 23 was on my mind.

However, the panic attacks and sleeplessness continued for the next 2 months at home, turning me into a zombie. Then, when I could not bear it anymore, a mountain-top experience. One afternoon alone in my hall, I begged God to be merciful and to stop the panic attacks.

A distinctly male voice, clearly audible though softly, said, Yes, David, I will heal you of your panic attacks.

Dare I claim that God, my Father in Heaven, spoke?

All I know is that from that moment forth, no more breathlessness from panic attacks and I could sleep. And, yes, it was a beautiful voice. Our God is a faithful God even though we are not. My eldest sister is 88 years old and has been attending church for as long as I remember. While I know for sure her late husband enjoyed a close walk with God, from his demeanor, and the evidence of the fruit of the Spirit in him, I was not too sure of my sister. I had asked God to let me know if hers is a genuine faith and not merely a pew warmer. Sure, we talked but because we always conversed in Cantonese, I was never completely sure. After some years, I stopped asking God about her, and I am not proud of that.

Towards the end of my 2-week sojourn in Serdang Hospital, my eldest sister's son came to visit along with a niece and an Alpha participant, I know this nephew goes to church now and again but I was never sure of his faith. As is my usual practice, I asked all 3 visitors to pray for me before leaving. The other two being devout Christians, had no issue even though there were 3 Muslim patients in that room that evening and I waited anxiously for my nephew's turn. My nephew duly prayed which was a joy for me.

The following week after my discharge, my eldest sister came to visit and I mentioned her son prayed for me in hospital. And then this happened:

My 88-year-old sister stood up and gave thanks to God for her son and prayed for me. I was overjoyed for I now know hers is a genuine faith. And though I had stopped asking God for confirmation of her faith, God did not forget. Isn't our God an amazing God?
