The Gospel and Love

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

A. No Love, Gifts = Nothing.

1 Corinthians 13:1-3 (NIV)

If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. 2 If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. 3 If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

1. a) Discussion Question. Do you find that leaders prioritise gifts over love in your church?

b) Reflection Question. Do you find yourself prioritising gifts over love in people?

B. What is Love?

1 Corinthians 13:4-7 (NIV)

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. 5 It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. 6 Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. 7 It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

d) Reflection Question. It seems like the Corinthian church heeded Paul's advice since Paul wrote them a second letter (2 Corinthians) and in 2 Corinthians 1:12-14 he mentions being proud of them and that he'll boast of them on the day of

the Lord Jesus. Can you think of brothers and sisters in Christ that you would dare to boast about to God?

2 Corinthians 1:12-14 (NIV)

Now this is our boast: Our conscience testifies that we have conducted ourselves in the world, and especially in our relations with you, with integrity and godly sincerity. We have done so, relying not on worldly wisdom but on God's grace. 13 For we do not write you anything you cannot read or understand. And I hope that, 14 as you have understood us in part, you will come to understand fully that you can boast of us just as we will boast of you in the day of the Lord Jesus.

C. Love Carries on to Eternity

1 Corinthians 13:8-13 (NIV)

Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. 9 For we know in part and we prophesy in part, 10 but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. 11 When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me. 12 For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

13 And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

3. a) Objective Question. Choose the most appropriate answer. "when completeness comes" in verse 10 refers to:

b) Reflection Question. According to Dr. Peter, LOVING IS DYING TO SELF, which looks like:

“My strong craving for a trouble-free life must die.”

“My need for an uninterrupted schedule must die.”

“My demand that frustrations and interference get out of my way must die.”

Case Study

Case 1 – Love over Gifts

Sunny Tai Zher attends Fourth Baptist Church. She works hard to run a Chinese Ministry in the church. Sunny has many talents, in preaching and managing the ministry, but is bossy and tyrant, she wants those under her to be as productive as possible and cuts them out of the ministry if they are not giving her the results she wants. She is short-tempered and is very harsh and often rude to those who work with her.

One day, one of the leaders confronted Sunny directly and told her that the way she ran the ministry was not loving and appealed that she repent and change and ask God to show her a more loving way to do things.

Sunny got really angry and exploded on the leader, saying “DO YOU KNOW HOW MUCH I SACRIFICED FOR THIS MINISTRY? I worked like a dog and sacrificed my time and money to build this ministry for two decades! The ministry started with 10 people and now has 300 people! Don't you dare question the way I do things!”

1. a) Discussion question. Was the church at fault for letting Sunny run in that way for 20 years? Was all the fault with Sunny alone for being a tyrannic leader? How much percent of blame would you contribute to each?

b) Discussion question. How can we tell if a person loves the church (the church is the people, not the building)? Run through the list in 1 Corinthians 13:4-7 to see if Sunny showed love.

2 Corinthians 8:7-8 (NIV)

But since you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in the love we have kindled in you—see that you also excel in this grace of giving.

I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others.

d) Discussion question. Does God care more about the church building or His people (the church)?

Case 2 – Toxic person

Toh See Yek is boastful, prideful, controlling, rude, and self-centred. 9/10 things that come out of his mouth are negative. He very rarely has nice things to say. Even the good “things” he praises people are often white lies so that he can manipulate people to do his bidding. He often lies and believes in his own lies to be true.

See Yek has attended Second Baptist Church for 5 years and has offended a lot of people in those 5 years. See Yek often gossips and slanders people he doesn’t get along with.

Timothy Keller quote:

“God sees us as we are, loves us as we are, and accepts us as we are. But by His grace, He does not leave us as we are.”

2. a) Discussion question. According to the video lecturer, Dr. Peter proposes that all of us are toxic so we shouldn’t avoid toxic people. However, 1 Corinthians 5:9-13 asks us not to even eat with people who are greedy and a slanderer, yet claim to be

Christians. See Yek is clearly toxic. So should we avoid See Yek or not? Can we eat with See Yek?

Supplementary Reading

1 Corinthians 5:9-13 (NIV)

I wrote to you in my letter not to associate with sexually immoral people— not at all meaning the people of this world who are immoral, or the greedy and swindlers, or idolaters. In that case you would have to leave this world. But now I am writing to you that you must not associate with anyone who claims to be a brother or sister but is sexually immoral or greedy, an idolater or slanderer, a drunkard or swindler. Do not even eat with such people.

What business is it of mine to judge those outside the church? Are you not to judge those inside? God will judge those outside. “Expel the wicked person from among you.”

Matthew 18:15-20 (NIV)

“If your brother or sister sins, go and point out their fault, just between the two of you. If they listen to you, you have won them over. But if they will not listen, take one or two others along, so that ‘every matter may be established by the testimony of two or three witnesses.’ If they still refuse to listen, tell it to the church; and if they refuse to listen even to the church, treat them as you would a pagan or a tax collector.

“Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.

“Again, truly I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about anything they ask for, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them.”

b) Discussion question. How do we know if we rebuked someone in love?

You feel genuine sorrow that they refused to repent and chose the way to sin stubbornly, just like how Paul feels in 2 Corinthians 2:4, with many tears of anguished love, hoping the Corinthian church will repent.

2 Corinthians 2:4 (NIV)

“For I wrote you out of great distress and anguish of heart and with many tears, not to grieve you but to let you know the depth of my love for you”

c) Reflection question. Have you ever felt this kind of love for your brothers and sisters in Christ? Would you pray for it?
