Part 1 of 3: Allows us to See Each Other in a New Light (Romans 14:1-4)

Verse 1-4

Romans 14:1-4

Accept the one whose faith is weak, without quarreling over disputable matters. One person's faith allows them to eat anything, but another, whose faith is weak, eats only vegetables. The one who eats everything must not treat with contempt the one who does not, and the one who does not eat everything must not judge the one who does, for God has accepted them. Who are you to judge someone else's servant? To their own master, servants stand or fall. And they will stand, for the Lord is able to make them stand.

Part 2 of 3: Allows us to the Freedom of Conscience (Romans 14:5-12) Verse 5-6			
Romans 14:5-6 One person considers one day more sacred than another; another considers every day alike. Each of them should be fully convinced in their own mind. Whoever regards one day as special does so to the Lord. Whoever eats meat does so to the Lord, for they give thanks to God; and whoever abstains does so to the Lord and gives thanks to God.

Verse 7-9

Romans 14:7-9

For none of us lives for ourselves alone, and none of us dies for ourselves alone. If we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord. So, whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord. For this very reason, Christ died and returned to life so that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living.

4) Reflection question. Verse 7-8 says that whether we live or die, we do it for the Lord and not for ourselves. Share how often you incorporate the Lord's interest in your everyday living activities.

Verse 10-12

Romans 14:10-12

You, then, why do you judge your brother or sister? Or why do you treat them with contempt? For we will all stand before God's judgment seat. It is written:

"'As surely as I live,' says the Lord,
'every knee will bow before me;
every tongue will acknowledge God."

So then, each of us will give an account of ourselves to God.

5) Reflection question. In issues related to food, drinks, special days, and other morally neutral issues we are to not judge and hate others for their different belief and conviction as everyone will give an account on why they believe it to God, they just need to focus on their

own convictions. Do you find it hard to not judge/dislike/argue with those who disagree with you on these issues?

Background Information

"In both war and theology, there are battles to avoid. Just as we can be ineffective because of compromise or inertia, so too we can be ineffective because of impulsiveness or haste. In fact, I would suggest that a wise theologian, like a wise military general, will be characterized by patience far more frequently than by action. Most of the battles you could fight, you shouldn't. And I'd go so far as to say that the majority of doctrinal fights Christians have today tend to be over third-rank issues—or fourth (under the ranking system by Gavin Ortlund.)

The Four ranks:

- 1) First-rank doctrines are essential to the gospel itself.
- 2) Second-rank doctrines are urgent for the health and practice of the church such that they frequently cause Christians to separate at the level of local church, denomination, and/or ministry.
- 3) Third-rank doctrines are important to Christian theology, but not enough to justify separation or division among Christians.
- 4) Fourth-rank doctrines are unimportant to our gospel witness and ministry collaboration."

Part 3 of 3: Expresses Love in a Practical Way (Romans 14:13-23)

Verse 13-23

Romans 14:13-23

13 Therefore let us stop passing judgment on one another. Instead, make up your mind not to put any stumbling block or obstacle in the way of a brother or sister. 14 I am convinced, being fully persuaded in the Lord Jesus, that nothing is unclean in itself. But if anyone regards something as unclean, then for that person it is unclean. 15 If your brother or sister is distressed because of what you eat, you are no longer acting in love. Do not by your eating destroy someone for whom Christ died. 16 Therefore do not let what you know is good be spoken of as evil. 17 For the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking, but of righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Spirit, 18 because anyone who serves Christ in this way is pleasing to God and receives human approval.

19 Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification. 20 Do not destroy the work of God for the sake of food. All food is clean, but it is wrong for a person to eat anything that causes someone else to stumble. 21 It is better not to eat meat or drink wine or to do anything else that will cause your brother or sister to fall.

22 So whatever you believe about these things keep between yourself and God. Blessed is the one who does not condemn himself by what he approves. 23 But whoever has doubts is condemned if they eat, because their eating is not from faith; and everything that does not come from faith is sin.

Case Study

Case 1

There was a proposal in the third Methodist church from some leaders to compel everyone to go back to physical Sunday worship by stopping the online platform. The rationale was that corporate worship is best on a physical basis. Even though the current Covid daily numbers are high, the disease is mild in vaccinated people hence people should come back to the physical service even at a slight risk of the disease.

Stopping the online service will leave the members with no choice but to come back to church and if they do not then some leaders think that they are probably not spiritual and there is no loss if they migrate to other churches in response to this move.

Stopping online worship would instill discipline and give a sense of priority and holiness in worship as the online platform promoted laziness and a casual approach to worship which will not build up people.

Case 2

Toh Rae Mi and Toh Rae Mon are siblings who are both Christians.

Rae Mi is the older sister and believes that Christians should not have tattoos and piercings except for ears for females, and thinks that rock music, Harry Potter and Pokemon is Ungodly.

Rae Mon is the younger brother by 10 years, has tattoos, multiple piercings, and dyed blonde hair, loves rock music, and believes that Christians should be vegan to avoid animal cruelty and support the environment by using fewer plastics.

Rae Mi scolds Rae Mon for his hair, tattoos, piercings, and rock music whereas Rae Mon scolds Rae Mi for eating meat and being cruel to God's creation, and not caring for God's environment. They often fight over these issues.
