



Self deception

- Oxford Dictionary definition: The action or practice of allowing oneself to believe that a false or unvalidated feeling, idea or situation is true
- **Bible's definition:** The action or practice of allowing oneself to believe that *partial obedience* to God is acceptable

Saul's Self Deception

1 Samuel 15

- ⁷Then Saul attacked the Amalekites all the way from Havilah to Shur, near the eastern border of Egypt. ⁸ He took Agag king of the Amalekites alive, and all his people he totally destroyed with the sword. ⁹ But Saul and the army spared Agag and the best of the sheep and cattle, the fat calves and lambs—everything that was good. These they were unwilling to destroy completely, but everything that was despised and weak they totally destroyed. ¹⁰ Then the word of the LORD came to Samuel: ¹¹ "I regret that I have made Saul king, because he has turned away from me and has not carried out my instructions." Samuel was angry, and he cried out to the LORD all that night.
- ¹² Early in the morning Samuel got up and went to meet Saul, but he was told, "Saul has gone to Carmel. There he has set up a monument in his own honour and has turned and gone on down to Gilgal."

The LORD anointed you king over Israel. ¹⁸ And he sent you on a mission, saying, 'Go and completely destroy those wicked people, the Amalekites; wage war against them until you have wiped them out.' ¹⁹ Why did you not obey the LORD? Why did you pounce on the plunder and do evil in the eyes of the LORD?"
- ²⁰ "But I did obey the LORD," Saul said. "I went on the mission the LORD assigned me. I completely destroyed the Amalekites and brought back Agag their king. ²¹ The soldiers took sheep and cattle from the plunder, the best of what was devoted to God, in order to sacrifice them to the LORD your God at Gilgal."

The mechanism for self deception

¹² Early in the morning Samuel got up and went to meet Saul, but he was told, "Saul has gone to Carmel. There he has set up a monument in his own honour and has turned and gone on down to Gilgal."

¹³ When Samuel reached him, Saul said, "The LORD bless you! I have carried out the LORD's instructions."

Saul knows: "Now go, attack the Amalekites and totally destroy all that belongs to them. Do not spare them; put to death men and women, children and infants, cattle and sheep, camels and donkeys" (verse 3)

But Saul *chooses* **not to know**: But Saul and the army spared Agag and the best of the sheep and cattle, the fat calves and lambs—everything that was good (verse 9)

Therefore Saul conditions himself not to know: "I have carried out the LORD's instructions." (verse 13 and also 20-21)

But deep down inside...Saul knows: ²⁴ Then Saul said to Samuel, "I have sinned. I violated the LORD's command and your instructions. I was afraid of the men and so I gave in to them.

How the mechanism for self deception operates

- ...when you have a nagging pain in your body but refuse to see a doctor
-when staff that quit repeatedly accuse you of a certain managerial weakness
-when you did not get the promotion you felt you deserved and claim the company is racist

....is the same mechanism when...

- your son is accused of stealing in school and you accuse the headmaster of targeting him. Yet at home you make sure he doesn't know where you keep money
- Someone who you feel threatened your position in the company was forced to resign and your actions contributed to it but you say he deserved it

....and is the same for this level of self deception



2a. Blame shifting



- ¹¹ "What have you done?" asked Samuel.
- Saul replied, "When I saw that the men were scattering, and that you did not come at the set time, and that the Philistines were assembling at Mikmash, ¹² I thought, 'Now the Philistines will come down against me at Gilgal, and I have not sought the LORD's favor.' So I felt compelled to offer the burnt offering."

1. Ask yourself what is your heart really hearing

¹³ When Samuel reached him, Saul said, "The LORD bless you! I have carried out the LORD's instructions." (I heard the Lord)

¹⁴ But Samuel said, "What then is this bleating of sheep in my ears? What is this lowing of cattle that I hear?" (Actually you only heard the sound of sheep)

To obey is better than sacrifice, and to *heed* is better than the fat of rams (v22b).

- What you heard from your wife: "Is there anything wrong with the car? There is always this strange noise"
- What your heart is really hearing: "why can't you fix the car like most men?"
- Your reply: "There is nothing wrong with the car, dear"

- What you heard from your son's teacher: "Your son was involved in a fight with another boy"
- What your heart is really hearing: "are you saying I am a bad mother???"
- Your reply: "The other boy started the fight"

- What you heard from your girlfriend: "I think we should have someone walk with us through our relationship issues"
- What your heart is really hearing: "I agree but only if I still get what I want"
- Your reply: "Sure. I think it is a good idea"

- What you heard from your son's teacher: "There was a suicide in school and we understand it was due to bullying from some other kids"
- What your heart is really hearing: "I know my son was involved as I have seen him picking on this poor boy before. But I can't destroy my son's future and I will resolve now to be a better father"
- Your reply: "That's terrible. Is there anything we can do to help?"

2. Realize that God has already anointed you King

¹⁷ Samuel said, "Although you were once small in your own eyes, did you not become the head of the tribes of Israel? The LORD anointed you king over Israel.

"Worthy are you to take the scroll and to open its seals,

for you were slain, and by your blood you ransomed people for God from every tribe and language and people and nation,

¹⁰ and you have made them a kingdom and priests to our God, and they shall **reign on the earth**."

Revelations 5:10

⁹ But you are a chosen race, a **royal** priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light. ¹⁰ Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy. 1 Peter 2:9

Strive to live like how the King of Kings lived when he walked on earth

- Saul was the type of King who didn't accept consequences of his action.
- Jesus was the King of Kings that took upon himself the consequences of all the sins of fallen humanity.
- Saul avoided dealing with his dark side which eventually consumed him.
- Jesus faced the dark side of humanity with love because he knew that God's power could overcome our evil and create something new.
- Like Saul, we all need new hearts and minds that don't need to defend themselves or justify failure and selfishness.

3. Recognize the monuments in your life you have to tear down

¹² Early in the morning Samuel got up and went to meet Saul, but he was told, "Saul has gone to Carmel. **There he has set up a monument in his own honour** and has turned and gone on down to Gilgal."

The most dangerous monument in your life is the monument of yourself

 Saul's idol was his reputation as king and the respect he craved from people

- Self deception
- Self ignorance
- Self centeredness
- Self exaltation

The remedy to self deception

- Ask yourself what is your heart really hearing
- Realize that God has already anointed you King
- Recognize the monuments in your life you have to tear down
- Have the humility to know you need community to overcome self deception

What kind of community?
